

# Ten Simple Rules for Effective Advocacy

- 1. Identify and Target Key Decision Makers
- 2. Find a Legislative Champion
- 3. Ask for Specifically What You Want
- 4. Assume the Perspective of Others
- 5. Build and Preserve Your Credibility

# Ten Simple Rules for Effective Advocacy (Cont.)

- 6. Honor the Staff
- 7. Be Prepared to Compromise
- 8. Never Burn Your Bridges
- 9. Report Your Contacts
- 10. Be Persistent

### Suggested Strategies

- Visit in Groups of Twos and Threes
- Make Multiple Contacts / Develop a Relationship
- Use Personal Experiences
- Thank Them for Something they Have Already Done
- Always Remain Positive
- Report Every Visit

#### Budget Process and Timeline

- State Board of Education Submits Legislative Budget Requests (September 2020)
- 2. Governor Issues Recommended Budget (January 2021)
- Legislative Leadership Assigns Separate House and Senate Allocations (First Days of March)
- 4. Legislative Subcommittees Craft Budget Details (First two weeks of March)
- Legislative Appropriations Committees Amend and Pass Separate Budgets (3rd Week in March)
- 6. Full House and Senate Floor Budgets Amended and Passed (4th week in March)
- 7. Legislative Leadership Agrees to Conference Allocations (First weeks in April)
- 8. Conference Committees Negotiate Differences (Last 3 weeks of April)
- 9. Final Conference Report Deadline (April 27th)
- 10. Conference Reports Adopted (April 30th)

#### Budget Overview

- Big Picture State Budget All Issues
  - O State Missing \$2.7 Billion in Recurring Revenues for 2021-2022 and another \$1.8 Billion for 2022-2023.
  - Federal Government has Provided Billions in Relief in the Form on Non-Recurring Aide (approximately \$4 Billion Already for State and Local Governments)
- Governor Proposes \$285.5 Million Increase for K-12 Education Funding
- House and Senate Will Start Public Budget Process in March which will Likely Begin with Huge Recurring Cuts

## General Public Schools Funding

<u>Issue</u>	Governor's Recommended Budget
Total Potential for Public Schools	Increased by \$285.5 Million to \$22.79 Billion (1.27% Increase)
Funds Per Student	Increased Total Funds Available Per Student by \$232.69 to \$8,019.30 (2.99% Increase)
Base Student Allocation – (This is the Figure That Most Closely Represents the True Flexible Budget Increase Available in a Normal Year)	Increased by \$132.02 to \$4,451.51 (3.06% Increase)

### ESE Priority Budget Issue

- ESE Guaranteed Allocation
  - o Governor's Proposed Budget Would Decrease ESE Guaranteed Allocation to \$1,066,945,851.
    - 2.33% Decrease
    - \$25.4 Million Decrease
- House and Senate Currently Have Not Released Budget Detail to this Level

### ESE Selected Budget Issues

- ESE Special Grants
  - Family Cafe: \$950,000
  - Learning Through Listening: \$1,291,704
  - Special Olympics: \$500,000
  - Auditory-Oral Education Grant Funding: \$750,000
  - Associate Centers: \$577,758

### ESE Priority Budget Issues

- Instructional Materials
  - \$3.1 million Was Recommended for Digital Instructional Materials for ESE Students
  - \$270,987 was Recommended for Materials for Persons who are Partially Sighted

## ESE Priority Budget Issues

- CARD Centers Funding at \$9.4 Million
- University FDLR Centers are Funded at \$2.7 Million
- Full Services Schools are Funded at \$6 Million
- Adults with Disabilities Education Funded at \$7.65 Million
